## Grant Discussion:

This award is related to an application approved on Commissioners Court on 6/14/22. During the course of its operations, the Sheriff's Auto Theft Unit investigates cases of auto theft and auto burglary, conducts proactive sting operations, files charges as appropriate, and also provides training classes to peace officers regarding auto crimes prevention and apprehension. Funding is for part of the salaries of 23 FTEs, travel, and operating supplies. A match amount of \$188,256 is being provided by the Sheriff's Office. Also, an in-kind match of \$1,786,771 consisting of donated office space, is non-cash and not shown on this form.

**Budget Narrative**

All personnel are dedicated 100% to the grant. The unit is comprised of the Auto Theft/BMV Units, Proactive Unit, and administrative support personnel. All personnel are dedicated to the reduction of motor vehicle theft or motor vehicle theft related crimes. The unit completes the following duties and responsibilities: Investigate assigned and self-initiated cases, file charges and arrest suspects. - Conduct surveillance, LPR and covert operations. - Conduct salvage, VIN, and 68-A inspections. - Maintenance and deployment of bait vehicles for auto theft and BMV operations. - Develop intelligence from sources. - Provide local agency support with surveillance and covert operations. - Provide training and training coordination with HCSO and other agencies. - Process and file investigative and administrative documents and reports. - Maintains all documentation required by MVCPA for audit purposes. - Maintain a continual property inventory for all Auto Theft Task Force property. - Complete statistical analysis of crimes for more precise operational effectiveness. The individual job descriptions are as follows: LIEUTENANT - Provide leadership and function as Operational Commander. - Oversee administration and operation of unit. - Monitor progress and the attainment of unit mission and goals - Supervise and manage undercover operations and significant events. SERGEANT - Supervise a team of investigators. - Screen, assign, manage, and approve cases. - Monitor work quality. - Handle personnel administrative issues. - Direct supervision of significant events and covert operations acting as Team Leader. DEPUTY INVESTIGATOR - Investigate assigned and self-initiated cases. - File charges and effect arrests of suspects. - Conduct salvage inspections - Administer 68A inspections and VIN verifications. - Conduct bait vehicle, surveillance and covert operations. - Develop intelligence from sources. - Provide local agency support in surveillance operations. - Maintenance and deployment of bait vehicles. - Conduct LPR operations and manage systems. - Responsible for equipment setup and system monitoring during technical operations. CLERK - Process and file documents and reports. - Compile and prepare data for required periodic reports. - Maintain unit time records. - Collect raw data for investigators. - Miscellaneous administrative duties.

**G. Supplies and Direct Operating Expenses (DOE)**

CELLULAR PHONE SERVICE - Yearly cost of cellular phone service for sixteen (16) cellulares (\$75.00 per month each X 16 phones X 12 months = \$14,400.00). These are used by grant personnel for grant related business. LEASE VEHICLES - Yearly cost of twenty-one (21) lease vehicles (Three @ \$450 + seven @ \$500 + eleven @ \$575 each per month X 12 months = \$134,100.00). This lease will allow for the periodic exchange of undercover vehicles needed for surveillance activities. Each leased vehicle is assigned until the vehicle reaches a mileage limit of 34,000 miles, or if the undercover integrity of the vehicle is compromised, at which point the vehicle is exchanged through the leasing agent point of contact. COVERT TRACK BAIT VEHICLE MONITORING - Airtime for 1 Year of Unlimited 5 Second Updates & Annual Subscription to Access the CovertTrack Mapping Product (\$600.00 per year each X 3 = \$1,800.00 plus \$540.00 per year each X 6 = \$3,240.00). MODEMS CELLULAR SERVICE - Yearly cost of cellular service for five (5) modems (\$38 X 5 modems X 12 months = \$2,280.00). Computer aircards/modems used for undercover operations to create online accounts involving internet investigations and also used for video on BMV bait vehicles. ASSISTED PATROL - 1 year lease of covert device (\$2,400). Includes device, protective cover, software, cellular connections, and unlimited users to access to the cloud for tracking. OFFICE SPACE & UTILITIES - In-Kind Match for office space for two (2) locations = \$63,916.00 - Fisher Rd. facility (Estimated \$30,000.00 annual cost provided by Harris County Facilities and Property Management) plus Village Green facility (Actual cost of lease agreement is \$2,826.32 per month or \$33,916.00 annually) plus utilities (Estimated based on prior year's utility costs \$10,000.00 annually). **Application Narrative****Grant Introduction (Executive Summary) and General Information**

1.1 Briefly describe the organization and program operation. Provide a high level summary to the application and how it will affect the local community. (500 words or less)

*Harris County is located in the southeastern part of the state near Galveston Bay and its county seat is Houston, the largest city in*

Texas and fourth largest city in the United States. Harris County consists of 1,777 square miles with 1,703 square miles of land and 74 square miles of water. According to a 2019 population report, Harris County's population has grown to an estimated 4.8 million residents with over 2 million of those living in the unincorporated areas of Harris County. Over an 18 year period from 2010-2018, Harris County's population has grown more than twice as fast as the nation's population and is on track to become the second most populous U.S. County within the next few years. The Harris County Sheriff's Office is the primary law enforcement agency responsible for all unincorporated Harris County.

The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit is a specialized unit within the Criminal Investigations Bureau of the Sheriff's Office. The Auto Theft/BMV Unit work with municipalities and other agencies within the geographic area to combat motor vehicle theft and theft from motor vehicles. The Harris County Sheriff's Auto Theft/BMV Unit has a close working relationship with both the TxDMV Criminal Investigations Unit and NICB investigators. The Auto Theft/BMV Unit receives case assignments via internal case referrals, outside agency referrals, and proactive system searches to uncover trends and patterns related to potential organized criminal activity.

According to UCR reports, in 2020 the Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit investigated 6,846 motor vehicle thefts and 15,989 theft from motor vehicles including vehicle parts/accessories (Larceny from motor vehicles). The reported loss from the motor vehicle thefts was \$103,166,146, and the reported loss from theft from motor vehicles was \$23,336,070.

In addition to auto theft, theft from motor vehicle, and fraud-related motor vehicle crime investigations, the Auto Theft/BMV Unit conducts salvage yard inspections to ensure compliance with mandates. As a service to the citizens of Harris County, the Auto Theft/BMV Unit conducts 68-A inspections at no cost. Investigators conduct or participate in training sessions to further educate law enforcement on auto theft and theft from motor vehicle related crimes.

The MVCPA grant funding is essential to ensure that the Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit continues to have the resources and support to continue the efforts to deter vehicle theft and theft from motor vehicles through proactive investigations, high quality investigative techniques, and collaborative efforts across participating agencies and stakeholders.

Harris County is located in the southeastern part of the state near Galveston Bay and its county seat is Houston, the largest city in Texas and fourth largest city in the United States. Harris County consists of 1,777 square miles with 1,703 square miles of land and 74 square miles of water. According to a 2019 population report, Harris County's population has grown to an estimated 4.8 million residents with over 2 million of those living in the unincorporated areas of Harris County. The Harris County Sheriff's Office is the primary law enforcement agency responsible for all unincorporated Harris County.

The Harris County area has some extremely unique characteristics including: - There are several major interstate highways that intersect in the Houston area and connect to the Mexico border through the Southern District of Texas to the rest of the United States. - Houston's airports create one of North America's largest public airport systems and positions Houston as the international gateway to the south central United States, Mexico, Central, and South America. In 2017, over 53 million travelers passed through Houston's airports, including over 10 million international passengers. - The Port of Houston is a 25 mile long complex of diversified public and private facilities located just a few hours sailing time from the Gulf of Mexico. The Port of Houston has expanded with facilities now in multiple communities. The port consists of a petrochemical complex that is one of the largest in the world, and most of the Volkswagen cars sold in the United States pass through the Port of Houston. The port is ranked first in the United States in foreign waterborne commerce, second in the U.S. in total tonnage, and sixteenth in the world in total tonnage. - Houston is home to the Texas Medical Center, the largest in the world. The Texas Medical Center employs approximately 106,000 employees and hosts over 10 million patient encounters annually. - Numerous research facilities, diplomats, and international businesses sponsor H1B visa applications for workers. - Many major corporations have corporate headquarters located in the unincorporated areas of Harris County with the Northwest area of the county rapidly expanding business space. - There are 26 school districts located in Harris County and many college universities including TSU, Rice, and University of Houston, the third largest university in Texas. Harris County has 34 incorporated cities included in its boundaries along with 47 designated places or unincorporated communities. In spite of the massive population in the Harris County area, there are significant numbers of agricultural and livestock communities which increase demand for cheap, hard labor.

These unique qualities make all of Harris County a thriving, international hub of commerce and culture, yet these same qualities create the opportunity for a multitude of organized criminal activity, which poses numerous threats to our community. From the manufacture, sale, and distribution of narcotics, to human trafficking, smuggling, forced prostitution, weapons trafficking, robbery, and all other crimes there is a direct link to motor vehicle theft. Stolen vehicles are often used to facilitate other criminal activities whether being used for financial proceeds, a getaway vehicle, transportation of illicit items (drugs, humans, weapons, etc.), or domestic terrorism.

The unincorporated areas of Harris County exceed 2 million people and has grown 4.1% annually since 2000. Over an 18 year period from 2010-2018, Harris County's population has grown more than twice as fast as the nation's population and is on track to become the second most populous U.S. County within the next few years. The Harris County Sheriff's Office is the primary provider of law enforcement services to the unincorporated areas of the county and supplements police forces of incorporated areas.

The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit is a specialized unit within the Criminal Investigations Bureau of the Sheriff's Office. The Auto Theft/BMV Units work together with all incorporated municipalities within the geographic boundaries of Harris County as well as jurisdictions outside the immediate area to combat motor vehicle theft and theft from motor vehicles. The Auto Theft/BMV Unit receives case assignments via internal case referrals, outside agency case referrals, and proactive system searches to uncover trends and patterns related to potential organized criminal activities.

The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit is commanded by a Task Force Commander who oversees three supervisory personnel. One sergeant position was lost in May 2021. The individual units consist of an East and West Auto Theft/BMV Unit, a Proactive Unit, and administrative support personnel. According to UCR reports, in 2020 the Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Units investigated 6,846 motor vehicle thefts and 15,989 theft from motor vehicles including vehicle parts/accessories (Larceny from motor vehicles). The reported loss from the motor vehicle thefts was \$103,166,146, and the reported loss from theft from motor vehicles was \$23,336,070.

The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit supports other local municipalities, adjacent counties, NICB, insurance companies, Tax Office investigators, TxDPS, TxDMV, and state and federal agencies responsible for cargo at area ports. The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit regularly provides assistance and collaborates with numerous law enforcement agencies to combat motor vehicle thefts and theft from motor vehicles. As a service to the citizens of Harris County, the Auto Theft/BMV Unit conducts 68-A inspections at no cost. During the FY20 grant period, the Auto Theft/BMV Unit conducted 726 68-A and VIN verification inspections. In FY21, operations were temporarily suspended due to COVID-19, but inspections have since returned to normal operations. Investigators conduct or participate in training sessions to further educate law enforcement on auto theft and theft from motor vehicle related crimes. In FY21 due to COVID-19, training sessions were suspended but have since resumed. In FY20 grant period, investigators assisted with the practical portion of the Advanced Auto Theft class. In FY21, investigators conducted an Auto Theft-BMV class for law enforcement.

### Grant Problem Statement

According to 2020 UCR statistical reports, there were 15,989 Larceny from motor vehicle (including larceny of motor vehicle parts and accessories) cases reported by the Harris County Sheriff's Office during the reporting period. According to the UCR reports, the value of the property stolen during these incidents totaled \$23,336,070 including theft of motor vehicle parts and accessories.

According to the FY20 Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit statistical reports, the unit filed 23 criminal charges during the FY20 grant period and recovered \$809,575 worth of stolen property. The Proactive Unit conducted 54 proactive operations to deter theft from motor vehicle incidents. In addition to the reduction of personnel, the amount of operations conducted during the FY21 grant period was negatively impacted as operations were temporarily suspended due to COVID-19; however, operations have since returned to normal.

Over an 18 year period from 2010-2018, Harris County's population has grown more than twice as fast as the nation's population and is on track to become the second most populous U.S. County within the next few years. Harris County is unique among all counties in the nation for having an unincorporated area population in excess of two million residents. If it were incorporated, Harris County would be the second largest city in Texas, the fifth largest in the U.S. and would have a larger population than 14 U.S. states. Since 2000, over 80% of the population growth has been in the unincorporated area.

With the increased population comes a potential for increased vehicle and vehicle related crimes. The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit has been successful in identifying and criminally charging suspects for engaging in theft from motor vehicles; however, the increased population and potential population driven crime could offset those achievements.

The unincorporated areas of Harris County continue to see an increase in organized criminal activity as well as criminal gang activity. Organized criminal cliques will specifically target locations such as apartment complexes or large business parking areas to break into numerous vehicles during one criminal episode to maximize the amount of property they steal from the vehicles. Organized criminal groups are continuing to target citizens who visit banking institutions (Bank Jugging operations) and those who briefly leave their vehicles unattended at local gas stations (Slider operations), often reaching in and stealing purses or wallets left in plain sight. Harris County has recently experienced a new crime trend of gun jugging in which criminals prey on citizens leaving gun stores and gun ranges, and burglarize their vehicle in hopes of stealing their firearms.

Harris County has also seen a dramatic increase in catalytic converter thefts. The theft can occur quickly and discreetly. The item is then sold at a scrap metal business for the valuable precious metals it contains. Because of the lack of an identifier on the catalytic converter, it is extremely difficult for investigators to determine and/or prove the vehicle it was stolen from or locate a complainant. Motor vehicle parts including wheels, tires, vehicle ECM's, and truck tailgates remain a target by local offenders. These parts can be easily sold on social media sites or through local salvage yards or vehicle part retailers. Items often stolen from within the vehicle such as cell phones or other electronics are often resold or recycled through ecoATM locations. There has also been an increase in the number of construction equipment and commercial tools stolen from within trailers and listed for sale on various social media sites.

Below are the past three (3) year statistics for the Harris County Sheriff's Office according to the DPS UCR reports:

2018 Larceny Motor Vehicle Parts/Accessories- 1,536 offenses with a value of \$2,729,053.

2019 Larceny Motor Vehicle- 13,684 offenses with a value of \$17,450,954.

2019 Larceny Motor Vehicle Parts/Accessories- 2,135 offenses with a value of \$3,709,330.

2020 Larceny Motor Vehicle- 12,127 offenses with a value of \$14,554,714.

2020 Larceny Motor Vehicle Parts/Accessories- 3,862 offenses with a value of \$8,781,356.

*According to 2020 UCR statistical reports, there were 6,846 motor vehicle theft cases reported by the Harris County Sheriff's Office during the reporting period. According to the UCR reports, the value of the vehicles stolen during these incidents totaled \$103,166,146. UCR Statistics indicate there were 2,053 stolen vehicles recovered locally (does not include recoveries outside the jurisdiction of the Harris County Sheriff's Office or stolen in other jurisdictions and recovered locally).*

*According to the FY2020 Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft Unit statistical reports, the Auto Theft Unit filed 135 criminal charges during the FY2020 grant period and recovered \$24,364,506 worth of stolen vehicles. The unit conducted 43 proactive operations to deter motor vehicle theft incidents. In addition to the reduction of personnel, the amount of operations conducted during the FY21 grant period was negatively impacted as operations were temporarily suspended due to COVID-19; however, operations have since resumed to normal.*

*Over an 18 year period from 2010-2018, Harris County's population has grown more than twice as fast as the nation's population and is on track to become the second most populous U.S. County within the next few years. *The 2019 Motor Vehicles stolen locally then recovered- 731 appears to be under reported due to the NIBRS reporting change.*

2.3 Provide an assessment of the fraud-related motor vehicle crime problem in the coverage area of this application. Include loss data consistent with the reported incident numbers above.

*The Harris County Sheriff's Auto Theft/BMV Unit consists of seventeen (17) investigators who are responsible for investigating all of the motor vehicle thefts, theft from motor vehicles, and fraud-vehicle related crime for the entire agency.*

*According to the Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit statistical reports, the unit investigated 49 fraud-vehicle related crimes in 2019 and 27 cases in 2020. Prior to 2021, the Harris County Auto Theft/BMV Unit did not maintain statistics for charges filed specifically for Fraud-vehicle related crime. UCR data is not available because it is not kept for this specific offense. Data for Fraud Related Motor Vehicle Crime was obtained from data maintained internally as it is not specifically documented in UCR. These are fraud cases assigned to the Auto Theft Unit.*

*Fraud-vehicle related crime incidents have been increasingly identified. Local dealerships are being targeted through identity theft and false information to obtain credit. Other fraud related criminal activity is centered around the profitable sale of counterfeit or illegal sale of E-tags. Many postings can be found on social media sites offering up E-tags for sale from various listings potentially bringing in*

many thousands of dollars in revenue from these illegal sales transactions. Organized criminal groups are continuing to target citizens who purchase vehicles using online social media sites to conduct cash transactions. The innocent purchaser is provided a sophisticated set of counterfeit documents (title and bill of sale) and keys that are later identified at the Tax Office as fraudulent.

*The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Units conduct a combination of both proactive and reactive investigations receiving cases via internal referral, outside agency referral, and proactive system searches for open case assignments.*

*The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit consists of seventeen (17) investigators who are responsible for investigating all of the motor vehicle thefts, theft from motor vehicles, and fraud-vehicle related crime for the entire agency. This number of cases equates to approximately 130 burglary of motor vehicle cases per investigator per month. In April of 2019, the Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit lost the following positions: 7 investigators, 1 Public Awareness Deputy, and 1 clerk. This had a direct impact on the overall productivity of the unit which is evident in the decrease of charges filed and operations conducted during the FY19 and FY20 reporting period compared to the previous.*

*The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit conducts reactive investigations through the following activities: - Receive and review newly assigned cases on a daily basis, and conduct follow up investigations of reported thefts from motor vehicles. - Contact victims of theft from motor vehicle crimes, and determine resources and investigative methods required to identify potential suspects and recover stolen property. - Collaborate with other law enforcement agencies, insurance companies, tax office, local businesses (pawn shops, cell phone providers, etc.), or any other entity in order to identify potential suspects or recover stolen property. - Collaborate with the district attorney's office to file criminal charges on suspects identified during the investigative process once probable cause has been established. - Collaborate with other entities to identify patterns of criminal activity related to theft from motor vehicles and/or to identify prolific BMV offenders. - Collaborate with other agencies to reduce the number of theft from motor vehicle incidents, and provide assistance to reduce the number of thefts from motor vehicles including motor vehicle parts and accessories. - Identify, arrest, and participate in the prosecution of offenders who engage in theft from motor vehicles and motor vehicle related crimes including theft of parts and accessories from a motor vehicle.*

*The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit conducts proactive investigations through the following activities: - Conduct bait vehicle operations that target burglary offenders, arrest, file criminal charges, and participate in the prosecution of any suspects apprehended during such operations. - Follow up on tips from private citizens to identify prolific BMV offenders or locations which deal in the sale of stolen property and/or motor vehicle parts and accessories. - Collaborate frequently with the Harris County Sheriff's Office Crime Analysis and Intelligence (CAID) Unit to identify crime patterns and/or prolific offenders in order to target specific geographic areas with high levels of reported thefts from motor vehicle crimes or stolen vehicle parts and accessories. - Collaborate with other agencies (law enforcement, insurance companies, tax office, etc.) to share intelligence regarding theft from motor vehicle*

*crimes. - Conduct and participate in intelligence sharing meetings to identify patterns or areas of high crime related to theft from motor vehicles including stolen parts and accessories. - Provide assistance to other law enforcement agencies related to the reduction of theft from motor vehicle related crimes including parts and accessories.*

### 3.2 Functions of the proposed program related to motor vehicle theft.

*The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Units conduct a combination of both proactive and reactive investigations receiving cases via internal referral, outside agency referral, and proactive system searches for open case assignments.*

*The Harris County Sheriff's Auto Theft/BMV Unit consists of seventeen (17) investigators who are responsible for investigating all of the motor vehicle thefts, theft from motor vehicles, and fraud-vehicle related crime for the entire agency. In April of 2019, the Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit lost the following positions: 7 investigators, 1 Public Awareness Deputy, and 1 clerk. This had a direct impact on the overall productivity of the unit which is evident in the decrease of charges filed and operations conducted during the FY19 and FY20 reporting period compared to the previous.*

*The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Units conduct reactive investigations through the following activities: - Receive and review newly assigned cases on a daily basis, and conduct follow up investigations of reported motor vehicle thefts and vehicle recoveries both locally and elsewhere. - Contact victims of motor vehicle theft, and determine resources and investigative methods required to identify potential suspects and recover stolen vehicles. - Recover and seize stolen vehicles and/or parts, along with tools or equipment used in the commission of crimes. - Collaborate with other law enforcement agencies, insurance companies, tax office, local businesses (car dealerships, salvage yards, etc.), or any other entity in order to identify potential suspects or recover stolen vehicles or parts. - Collaborate with the District Attorney's Office to file criminal charges on suspects identified during the investigative process once probable cause has been established as well as for seizure and sale of property and to address repeat offenders and sentencing guidelines. - Collaborate with other entities to identify patterns of criminal activity related to motor vehicle thefts and/or to identify prolific motor vehicle theft offenders. - Collaborate with other agencies and provide assistance to reduce the number of motor vehicle thefts including motor vehicle parts and accessories, vehicle theft rings, fraudulent title transactions, vehicle insurance fraud, or other organized criminal activity related to motor vehicle theft. - Conduct investigations into criminal activity which is directly related to motor vehicle theft offenses such as title fraud investigations, insurance fraud investigations, fraudulent vehicle registration investigations (production/sale/distribution of fake license plates), etc. - Identify, arrest, and participate in the prosecution of offenders who engage in motor vehicle thefts and motor vehicle related crimes including theft of parts and accessories from a motor vehicle.*

*The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit conducts proactive investigations through the following activities: - Conduct bait vehicle operations that target motor vehicle theft offenders, arrest, file criminal charges, and participate in the prosecution of any suspects apprehended during such operations. - Follow up on tips from private citizens to identify prolific motor vehicle theft offenders or locations which deal in the sale of stolen property and/or motor vehicle parts and accessories. - Collaborate frequently with the Harris County Sheriff's Office Crime Analysis and Intelligence (CAID) Unit to identify crime patterns and/or prolific offenders in order to target specific geographic areas with high levels of reported vehicle thefts. - Engage social media and conduct surveillance operations to locate, identify, and attempt to infiltrate organized motor vehicle theft rings or those who attempt to sell stolen vehicles or parts to innocent purchasers. - Deploy license plate readers and respond to LPR alert notifications to identify and recover stolen motor vehicles and attempt to locate and arrest suspects engaged in the theft of motor vehicles. - Conduct covert operations designed to target motor vehicle theft offenders. - Conduct salvage yard inspections and VIN verification inspections (including 68A inspections) to confirm and verify vehicle identities and ensure compliance with salvage laws. - Conduct title service inspections and proactively follow up on questionable title transactions in collaboration with the local tax office and TxDMV. - Collaborate with other agencies (law enforcement, insurance companies, tax office, etc.) to identify crime patterns and/or prolific offenders in order to target specific geographic areas with high levels of reported motor vehicle thefts or stolen vehicle parts and accessories. - Collaborate with agencies relating to investigation and enforcement of vehicle insurance fraud and proactively conduct insurance fraud investigations and vehicle title fraud investigations. - Conduct and participate in intelligence sharing meetings to identify patterns or areas of high crime related to motor vehicle thefts including stolen parts and accessories. - Provide assistance to other law enforcement agencies related to the reduction of motor vehicle thefts including parts and accessories. Collaborate with the Harris County Sheriff's Office Violent Crimes Unit and TxDPS to target violent motor vehicle theft suspects including those who use stolen vehicles to further their violent criminal efforts.*

*The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit conducts education, awareness, and prevention activities to educate the general public about motor vehicle theft, theft from motor vehicle and fraud-related motor vehicle crimes. These goals are achieved using the following methods: - Educating the public in motor vehicle theft, theft from motor vehicle and fraud-related motor vehicle crimes prevention and awareness through educational programs/presentations offered at local HOA's, town halls, Chambers of Commerce, public events, etc. - Liaise with the public information officers to inform local media outlets of public service announcements in English and Spanish, press releases, interviews, and article publications related to motor vehicle theft, theft from motor vehicle and fraud-related motor vehicle crimes and crime prevention techniques. - Increase awareness of the risks associated with purchasing a vehicle through a social media/on-line marketplace and educate citizens of warning signs for fraudulent titles and purchases. - Proactively distributing promotional items and brochures to raise awareness and suggest techniques for the prevention of motor vehicle theft, theft from motor vehicle and fraud-related motor vehicle crimes. - Educating law enforcement personnel to enhance their response and initial investigation through training programs offered to patrol personnel as well as other agencies (both TCOLE accredited courses and through intelligence/information sharing meetings).*

*The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit conducts education, awareness, and prevention activities to educate the general public about motor vehicle theft, theft from motor vehicle and fraud-vehicle related motor vehicle crimes. These goals are achieved using the following methods: - Educating the public in motor vehicle theft, theft from motor vehicle and fraud-related motor*

The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit conducts reactive and proactive investigations involving motor vehicle fraud related crimes including fraudulent information to obtain credit or forgery of government documents/identity theft to obtain motor vehicle financing. The Auto theft/BMV Unit works with dealerships to identify fraudulent identifications and to identify offenders. The unit regularly collaborates with the Harris County Tax Office and receives investigations involving fraudulent or altered motor vehicle title documents. The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit continues to maintain a close working relationship with the NICB and the TxDMV. The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit will continue to investigate any insurance related fraud cases involving motor vehicle related crimes which are referred from insurance companies through NICB agents. The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit will continue to investigate any fraudulent activity related to the TxDMV including fraudulent, altered, or illegal E-Tag sales or any other investigations related to motor vehicle crimes referred through the TxDMV criminal investigations division. The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit maintains a relationship with the U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) to collaborate on port inspections to identify vehicles in an effort of preventing stolen vehicles from being exported.

The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit continues to maintain a close cooperative relationship with other MVCPA task forces throughout the state to combine efforts to combat motor vehicle theft and motor vehicle related crimes. The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit regularly shares information freely with other MVCPA task forces and often engages in joint operations/investigations with other agencies. The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft Unit will collaborate, assist, and cooperate with all entities which have a vested interest in reducing the number of motor vehicle related crimes and increasing public awareness regarding motor vehicle related crimes.

The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit regularly supports other local municipalities, adjacent counties, NICB, TxDMV, insurance companies, tax office investigators, TxDPS, and federal agencies responsible for cargo at area ports. This support covers all communities within the Harris County area including adjacent counties.

The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit works together with all incorporated municipalities within the geographic boundaries of Harris County as well as jurisdictions outside the immediate area to combat motor vehicle theft, theft from motor vehicles, and fraud-related motor vehicle crimes. The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit regularly communicates with agencies throughout Harris County to share information and intelligence. The unit is often called upon by other agencies to assist with providing offense reports, identify vehicles, and to assist with investigations. The unit conducts joint undercover operations with other agencies to combat vehicle thefts and thefts from motor vehicles.

The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit regularly assists other local task force agencies including the Houston Police Department, Pasadena Police Department, Galveston County Sheriff's Office, and the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office by sharing resources and combined efforts to combat vehicle related criminal activity. The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit regularly participates in intelligence sharing and educational endeavors across jurisdictional boundaries to coordinate efforts in combating vehicle related crimes. The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit will continue to collaborate with other task force agencies who are dedicated to implementing grant funded activities by freely sharing resources, intelligence information, personnel, and training resources.

The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit regularly collaborates and provides information and assistance to other law enforcement agencies and other parties with a vested interest in the prevention and investigation of motor vehicle theft, theft from motor vehicle and fraud-vehicle related crimes (ie. district attorney's office, insurance companies, NICB, tax office, TxDMV, etc.)

The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit regularly collaborates with other entities to identify patterns of criminal activity related to theft from motor vehicles and/or to identify prolific offenders. The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit collaborates with other agencies responsible for crimes involving motor vehicle theft and theft from motor vehicles, and provides assistance to reduce the number of criminal incidents including conducting salvage yard or title service inspections and enforcement of regulations. The unit also collaborates with other agencies (law enforcement, insurance companies, tax office, TxDMV, NICB, TxDPS, etc.) to identify crime patterns and/or prolific offenders in order to target specific geographic areas with high levels of reported motor vehicle thefts or theft from motor vehicle related crimes.

The Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit will continue to provide assistance to other law enforcement agencies to combat motor vehicle theft and theft from motor vehicles, and will continue the open information sharing and collaboration with other



law enforcement agencies and those who have a direct interest in the prevention and investigation of motor vehicle theft and theft from motor vehicle related crimes.

*Statistical data is collected and maintained by Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit administrative personnel on a continual basis. The raw data and unit statistics are compiled monthly through the Superior Software program, and the information is submitted through the chain of command via monthly reports. Up to date case information is also compiled weekly from investigator case files, significant event bulletins and call out reporting documents and submitted through the chain of command to the Criminal*

*Investigations Bureau Commander for use and presentation during staff meetings with the Sheriff and Executive personnel. These statistics are also reviewed and evaluated internally to determine the productivity and effectiveness of the units through basic Excel spreadsheets. Charge information and arrest information are obtained from the JWeb software program.*

*Indicators that are reviewed and considered during the evaluation include: charges filed, cases received, cases closed, vehicles/property recovered, salvage/title service inspections conducted, bait operations conducted, training events, 68A inspections completed, etc. When compiling the monthly progress reports for MVCPA, all raw data and reported statistics are compared to proof documents to verify and confirm the numbers provided in the report. All proof documents are maintained for audit requirements.*

*Monthly reports are compared to prior annual reports to evaluate the effectiveness of the programs goals and strategies. The goal of the Auto Theft/BMV Unit is to increase performance and surpass the stated goals and objectives through more efficient and effective investigative techniques. Continued evaluation of statistical data including Comstat reporting analysis ensures all objectives and goals will be met and properly reported to the Sheriff's Office command staff as well as the MVCPA board and staff.*

*Because of the high recidivism rate associated with motor vehicle theft and theft from motor vehicle crimes, a good measure of success for the Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft/BMV Unit is reflected by identifying prolific offenders (1.1.2 & 2.1.2.) and persons arrested (1.1.17 & 2.1.13). Another measure of success is maintaining and increasing community outreach through events and social media (3.1.1, 3.1.7, & 3.1.10).*
